The story of Holy Trinity began in the late 1940s when pastor Robert W. Long of Faith Lutheran Church, Arlington, Virginia, proposed to the Eastern District of the American Lutheran Church the organization of a mission congregation in rural Falls Church, Virginia. The proposal was accepted and three lots were purchased at the corner of Arlington Boulevard and With so much giving, we cannot forget the family Woodlawn Avenue. The Congregation first worshiped together on September 12, 1948, with 40 adults joined the great eternal feast with Christ. Holy Trinity and 21 children in attendance at the Hillwood Square said goodbye to many loved ones and friends who were Community Hall.

How do we start to celebrate being God's community in Falls Church, VA, for seventy years? Maybe with gratitude. We could start with thanks and appreciation for the gift of Jesus Christ who binds us all together, and the Gospel that inspired a pastor and 61 children and adults to be a church. We could give thanks for the Holy Spirit that gave those first individuals and families the courage, strength and will power to gather on a weekly basis and invite others into their community.

We could also give thanks for the many generations and generous hearts who found Holy Trinity to be their church home, but also gave generously to respond to the needs of their growing community and expanded its building and footprint for us all to enjoy today.

We could also give thanks for the many ways Holy Trinity has impacted the local community and the world with the support of countless mission appeals, the support of people in need and the response to international concerns. Taking into consideration all the major world events, natural disasters and global changes over the past seventy years, Holy Trinity responded in incalculable ways.

members and friends who died in the faith and have a blessing to us and to our faith community.

We will come together to celebrate our seventy years of faithful living as a community in Christ on Sunday, September 9th, but we also get to celebrate our calling to work together to be the church for our world today: a world that looks much different from the "rural" Falls Church of seventy years ago. Our calling is to continue to be faithful and generous, but also to be proactive and discern new ways God is calling us to be the church to an increasingly diverse and secular world.

Let us all come together and celebrate. Let us celebrate our beautiful past, our fantastic and vibrant present, and our hopeful and promising future.

# Council News

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven"

--Ecclesiastes 3:1

One morning last week I walked out the door and it felt a little like fall (of course this week it's back to extreme summer!) and it got me thinking about seasons and change (hence Ecclesiastes!).

At this season of the year, we would normally be preparing to move back to two services on Sunday mornings. Since I joined Holy Trinity, each summer when we moved to a single service I would see people who attended the late service and think "it's so nice to see them again!". And I would feel less rushed in the morning before service and think "this is kind of nice". And I would look around during worship and feel a different energy as we all gathered as a single body. In talking to other members of the congregation, I think many of us felt the same way about our summer schedule, but many of us also appreciated the different worship styles of our two services from fall through spring and the way the worship times fit into our schedules.

But this year, rather than returning to two services from our summer single-service schedule as we've done in years past, we will continue with a single service at 10 a.m. This change was the result of a great deal of discussion and individual discernment—by all of us on council, by the committee formed to survey the congregation about a potential change, and by each of you as you responded to that survey. I wanted to thank all of you who took the time to give us your views, as well as the entire congregation for your willingness to try this new way of worshipping together.

As we've noted in the announcements that have been in the bulletin during August, we're adopting the change as a one-year trial. At the end of the year we will again seek your input as to whether we should make the change permanent or return to a two-service schedule in the fall of 2019. And as we live into the change, all of us on council would welcome your thoughts on ways to improve the new schedule or any problems you may see—just drop us a note in the council mailbox in the church office.

The music and worship team is already working to make sure all worship styles are reflected in our new schedule, and a single service will ensure that our ushers, assisting minister, acolytes and other volunteers will be less stretched each week. We hope this change will be a positive for all of us and bring us closer together as part of the body of Christ!

In addition to this big change, Council has been working on some smaller changes—I hope you've had a chance to use the new water fountain and water bottle filler in the Fellowship Hall!—as well as continuing to manage more recent changes, as our daycare tenant continues to welcome more children, as we welcome our new vicar, Corey Bergman, and as we plan for events in the fall such as our 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration, our continuing music series and the upcoming Octoberfest event.

Finally, I want to thank all of you for the opportunity to serve as our congregation's president and to thank my fellow members of church council for their service, including our newly elected treasurer, Joe Kile, and secretary, Terri Fleck, as well as Terry Bathen, Seth Clark, Karen Cockerham, Julie Davis, Pamela Kabati, Mark Kerr, Scott Sherard, Brent Stone and Lori Wicks.

Hello Everyone! Thanks so much for your questions. I hope you learn from and enjoy my responses!

When is your birthday? I was born on February 24<sup>th</sup> in 1994. I've always been told that a blizzard hit the day I was born.

**How many brothers and sisters do you have?** I have one younger brother named Devin. He just turned 20 this past July. We get along better now that we are older and no longer live under the

same roof. We also have voices and speech patterns very similar to my Dad's so we get confused for each other over the phone.

**Dog or Cat person?** Both? I grew up with dogs. When I was really little we had a small horse of a German shepherd named Monty. Then for most of my youth we had a Shetland sheepdog named Mack (well, technically his breeder/birth certificate said "Laird McGregor of the Hills" but we just called him Mack). Right now my parents have a small dog mix named Albus. That being said, I do like cats as well; my mom was just allergic so we never had them growing up. Recently my fiancée Maddie and I adopted two little sister kittens we named Eliza and Angelica.

What do you need the most hands on experience with at the congregational level and how can HT best help you with that? I think the two areas I need the most help with are administration (which Joan has been an amazing help with) and getting to know people. As an Introvert it usually takes me a while to get to know people, and in congregations a lot of the socializing seems to be done during large group things like coffee hour after service where I'm not at my most comfortable. This means the thing you can do that would most help me is exactly the invitation John gave when I was welcomed into Holy Trinity. Invite me to get to know you outside the walls of the church where you do your living. Of course I plan on making my own invitations as well; but you all know where you are your best self, and those are the places I want to meet you. It doesn't have to be at a dinner table it can be a swim meet, a coffee shop, or even your place of work. I want to get to know you, not just your face in the pew on Sunday morning.

Day in the Life (of a Vicar) Paraphrasing the Beatles "I read the news today, oh boy..."? To be quite honest I'd never heard this song before so I had to look it up before I could respond to the question. My parents are more Genesis/ Journey/Styx listeners than Beatles listeners. I mean, my hair doesn't really need a comb so I usually just throw some pomade in it (insert Jonathan from Queer Eye gif here) and run out the door coffee in hand, to burst through the office doors about 5 minutes before I'm supposed to start my day. What, as a result of your own personal gifts and talents do you hope to leave with us as your contribution to our growth and well-being during the coming year? In the grand scheme of things, I'd love to contribute more to the well-being (I'm making 0 promises or hopes on the growth piece) of the youth programming here than anything else. Mostly because that is where my talents and experiences are but also because I think there are parts of my story that might resonate more with the youth here than other Pastors/volunteers/adults. And those parts of my story give me a different perspective on the Gospel that they might find easier to engage with. I know what it is like to grow up in the pressure cooker that is a modern high school in a well-to-do area. I remember feeling (as far back as 3<sup>rd</sup> grade) as if it was a competition to get into special classes and groups, and that getting in to them was a measure of my worth as a person. I think the part that really makes me unique, though, is that I could be labeled as having "failed" when it came to all that competition if you compare me to some of my peers, but I also like to think the system failed me instead. In all honesty, I'm not sure what my impact will be but I look forward to finding out alongside all of you. Peace,



# **Getting Connected**

During our 70th anniversary year, we will feature Holy Trinity's history by decades. This article covers the 1940's and 1950's.

#### **HOLY TRINITY'S EARLY HISTORY**

In the late 1940's the pastor of Faith Lutheran Church in Arlington proposed the organization of a mission church in the then rural area of Falls Church. In the fall of 1947 corner of Arlington Boulevard and Woodlawn Avenue for this future church. In the spring of 1948 a call was extended to Rev. Edward Yost to serve as a temporary assistant at Faith Lutheran for the purpose of developing the new mission church.

The new mission church's first service and Sunday School were held on Sunday, September 12, 1948, with 40 adults attending the service and 21 children enrolled in Sunday School. The location of the first service was Hillwood Square Community Hall, a "temporary" defense building near Cherry Street in Falls Church. Holy Trinity Lutheran Church was formally organized on January 24, 1949.

The congregation outgrew its temporary location and starting in April of 1949 met at Jefferson Theater (now the Goodwill Retail Store and Donation Center) on Annandale Road near Arlington Boulevard.

On October 22, 1950, Pastor Yost was installed as pastor of Holy Trinity. The groundbreaking ceremony for a church building (the current Rothenberg Hall) was held on March 4, 1951. In that same year Holy Trinity began the American Lutheran Church purchased three lots at the its sponsorship of Boy Scout Troop 140 and a Couples Club was formed. Shortly after its formation, the Couples Club sponsored a refugee family from Germany, the Rothenbergs.

> In 1952, Holy Trinity purchased its first parsonage and opened a Christian Day School. The first kindergarten class of 29 pupils graduated in 1953. On Holy Trinity's 5th anniversary (1954) its status changed from mission church to full church status, with communicant membership at 217 and Sunday School enrollment at 350 children. A new two-story education building (currently the pastors' offices, church office, and library/conference room) was dedicated on August 28, 1955.



Saturday, August 11—Thanks to all of you for contributing to this project! Here is an initial report on today's event for documentation.

8:30 am--station was set up.

9:00 am--first volunteers arrive, rock removal and weeding begins. Weeds were trashed, rocks disposed of.

10:00 am--18 volunteers total have shown up. Most large rocks have been moved out. Weeds are gone. Work begins on major roots and

flattening the terrain.

11:30 am--23 volunteers in total have signed in. Victory over the largest stumps is achieved.

12:00 pm--terrain mostly flattened. Soil builder is applied to the ground. 12:30 pm--Vocelli's fails to delivery pizzas, morale wavering. Grass seed is also applied as work begins on digging holes for new shrubbery. Brick edging put in.

1:00 pm--Pizza arrives for remaining volunteers.

1:30 pm--Holes dug

into ground for shrubbery, watering and clean up begins.

Some work will continue to ensure adequate watering, but largely the project is done. Total volunteer man-hours of labor: 71 and 10 minutes (roughly) -- not including preparation time.

Special thanks to Betty's Azalea Ranch and Karen Cockerham for the plants, Craig Harner for transporting soil builder, Dave Badger for coordination with the church, and Jeffrey Ihnen for advising along the way. And also to my father for putting up with me (but he doesn't need to know I said that).



# Maryland News WTOP by Kristi King 8/9/2018: Maryland ramps up fight against human trafficking with funding, new state position

Maryland is accelerating its fight against human trafficking with millions of dollars in state funding to support or create multiple initiatives that help victims and go after criminals. Maryland Gov. Larry Hogan said as a father, he finds human trafficking despicable. "I'm heartbroken for these daughters and sons who are being victimized and brutalized," Hogan said, his voice choked with emotion.

During a news conference Thursday in Rockville, Maryland, Hogan signed an executive order to create the position of "Anti-Human Trafficking Director," who will engage with and coordinate with communities that are addressing the issue throughout the state.

"This is going to be a multidisciplinary collaboration," said Glenn Fueston, executive director of the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention. "We're going to be able to move forward, so it's working across those lines of public safety, public health (and) victims services." Informed, evidence-based strategies: A half-million dollar grant will help the University of Maryland create a Crime Research and Innovation Center for the state that will develop strategies for law enforcement, prevention and victim services. "In order to show progress, move things forward, develop programs that are evidence-based, measure the impact — and repeat," Fueston said.

### **Our Commitment:**

We, the Women of the ELCA, are committed to help eradicate human trafficking by creating awareness in our communities, advocating for more protection and rehabilitation for victims, and participating in antitrafficking campaigns in our churches, schools, and neighborhoods.

**Data mining to target criminals:** A new pilot program to include Maryland's U.S. attorney's office and multiple police departments and agencies will analyze 2,000 criminal cases "to develop timely, accurate and actionable intelligence to help take down human trafficking networks," Hogan said.

**Helping victims:** The \$5 million to help victims of human trafficking will go toward things such as emergency shelter, a 24-hour talk-line, housing assistance, GED and vocational training, help getting a driver's license or transportation to and from appointments, and legal help.

**Support existing efforts:** More than \$4 million in new grants will go to localities participating in the Maryland Criminal Intelligence Network that targets gangs and violent criminal networks. Montgomery County received \$257,400 in funding, and Prince George's County was awarded \$195,160. A participating Hyattsville coalition was awarded \$387,116.

**Proposed legislation:** Hogan is among state officials who want to increase penalties against human traffickers by classifying the offense as a violent crime. Legislation to do that failed in 2018. "The Senate voted unanimously to pass this legislation. Unfortunately, and inexplicably, the House failed to pass this common sense proposal," Hogan said. During the state's next legislative session that begins in January, Hogan will try again and introduce the Felony Human Trafficking Act of 2019.
