Pastor's Peace



Sunday, June 3rd launched our summer season here at Holy Trinity. We started off the first of our two summer preaching series talking about the baptismal practice of the Gaul warrior population from Northern France and Belgium. In case you missed the message, the Gaul warriors would come into the water to be baptized by a priest, usually in a river or lake by full immersion, but would keep one hand out of the water and dry. Why did they do this? The Gaul warriors believed if they kept one hand dry, they could say that hand was "not baptized" and would be justifiably free to use it to wield a sword and attack enemies at will.

We may not have swords to wield, but sometimes we act like the Gaul warriors and attempt to keep other parts of our life dry from the baptismal waters of love, abundance, grace, forgiveness and life in Christ. When asked about the elements of our life we regularly try to keep from the baptismal life, one person mentioned driving while another mentioned politics; but there are other elements such as work, family, and money which fall into that same category.

The first part of the summer we are going to talk about Stewardship, or that act of getting completely wet in the baptismal waters. We are going think about the elements of our lives we attempt to keep dry, and the benefits of handing those items over to God and embracing God's full control of our lives.

During the second part of the summer we are going to talk about rest and abiding with God. While we are together we will talk about the ways God and Jesus intentionally bring rest into their routines and how we can create some regular healthy practices. The hope is, by the time the summer comes to the end, we can use some of God's wisdom and put some healthy routines in place as we start the busier fall season.

Summer is great time to be together. I am looking forward to these two seasons of Sunday worship, but I am also looking forward to our time of fellowship and fun. Be on the lookout over the next few months, for ways to relax and enjoy each other's company.

Lastly, with the arrival of our new intern, Corey Bergman, and the preparations of our 75th anniversary, please let me know if you have a little extra time this summer to volunteer. Your help is always appreciated.

Council News

I've been thinking a lot about salt and light lately. Specifically, the salt and light referred to in Matthew 5:13-16:

You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot. You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven. (Matt. 5:13-16)

This was the favorite Bible verse of a friend of mine – a woman of great faith and kindness – who died recently at age 70 after a 27-month battle with advanced stage lung cancer, even though she wasn't a smoker. Laura left behind a devoted husband who'd retired just a couple of years before Laura became ill; two wonderful, accomplished children; several grandchildren; and many friends. Whenever she sent her family off in the mornings or talked with them on the phone, her good-bye was always to tell them she loved them, and then to remind them to be "salt and light" in the world. And, in turn, they would remind others. Laura's husband, Frank, and I worked together for more than 15 years, and often before or after a difficult meeting at the office or when I'd become cranky about something going on at work, he'd gently pass Laura's admonition on to me: "Remember...salt and light."

So, in this last column I have the honor of writing on behalf of your church council, I wanted to pass Laura's wise counsel on to you, in her honor. I'm no Biblical scholar – not even close – so you can take my interpretation of "salt and light" here with a grain of...dare I say it?...salt. But here goes: Salt is the flavoring of life, also a preservative, and a disinfectant – in short, it's very useful. As Christians, be useful and add flavor wherever you go, is what I hear Matthew saying here. The "light" part seems self-explanatory: Be a light in the world in a way that lets your actions speak for themselves and do honor to God. In short: Be useful, add flavor, and brighten things up wherever you go, and in so doing, you allow Jesus to work through you, and you pay honor and homage to God.

To be sure, your council over the last year has tried to be part of the salt and light in our church community, in part by focusing on ways to help Holy Trinity grow and flourish into the future:

- We have welcomed new people and new organizations into our church over the last year, including a child day care tenant, a local theater company, and 11 new families, as Pastor Mike reported at our June 3 Congregational Meeting.
- We also welcomed a new part-time minister to focus on our youth and family ministry, Pastor Krista, who is spearheading our planning for and participation in the ELCA's National Youth Gathering in Houston later this month, where seven youths from our church will be spreading salt and light. Krista will be with us through the summer to help us launch another new program, mainly music, for parents and young children within our walls, before moving on to find a full-time pastor position of her own. We're grateful to her for her work at Holy Trinity and wish her all the best in the next chapter of her ministry.
- Our outreach efforts in the Mosaic District continue on Wednesday nights, Thursday mornings, and Sunday afternoons, with new programming this summer and fall. You can find out more about these efforts at http://mosaicdistrictchurch.org/
- We've been looking at new ways of doing things in a number of areas, instead of relying on the status quo. A few examples:
 - We're exploring the idea of whether our congregation would be well served by moving to one Sunday service year round.
 - We've taken a new approach to planning our church calendar that requires we have a volunteer coordinator for each event we commit to scheduling as a way to determine which events our members truly value.
 - And we're being more proactive and strategic in how we deal with our property management, seeking to identify our maintenance issues and plan for how we'll address them months and even years ahead of time.

He will be with us for a year to assist Pastor Mike, to be mentored by him, and to learn from him and others in our congregation what it means to be salt and light in the Holy Trinity style. Special thanks to the Beckers and John English who will be helping Corey with housing and with his initial assimilation into Holy Trinity.

Also in July, the church council will hold its first meeting with its new president, Mary Minette, who was elected at our June 3 Congregational Meeting to lead the council. There is no doubt that she is a person of salt and light who will do an excellent job in this role. Also elected to council at the Congregational Meeting for terms beginning July 1 were Seth Clark, Terri Fleck, Joe Kile, Brent Stone, and Lori Wicks. All of us owe a debt of gratitude to these folks for being willing to carve time out of their busy lives to serve in a leadership role in our church. They are all people of salt and light, to be sure.

Finally, I want to share with you how honored I've been to have served as your council president for the past twelve months. I'm lucky to have worked with a team of awesome people who devoted a lot of time, energy, and thought to the leadership and stewardship of this great congregation of kind and giving people. Many thanks to Terry Bathen, Eric Chancellor, Karen Cockerham, Julie Davis, Marcia Ihnen, Mark Kerr, Aurelia Khorsand, Mary Minette, the late Harry Search, Scott Sherard, Patrice Shibuya, Anne Simmons, and Pastor Mike for their service this last year. We missed Harry on council very much after he passed away suddenly last September, and we've missed Eric, as well, after he resigned as council vice president a few months ago to turn his full attention to fighting cancer and restoring his health.

Special thanks to Marcia and Anne, who after serving six years on council, including a year each as president, are retiring from the church council this year. (Holy Trinity's Constitution mandates that no member may serve more than two consecutive three-year terms.) We also say good-bye to Aurelia this summer, who's leaving council and Holy Trinity to make a bold move in her life...to live in France! I also want to personally thank the officers of the council who served with me this year – Terry as treasurer, Julie as our secretary, and Eric as vice president until his health issues arose; you all were a great team and always put your hearts into your work! Terry steps down as our treasurer on June 30 after three strong years of overseeing the church's finances, but, happily, he'll continue as a member of council for another three-year term.

From all of us on your church council – the old members and the new – we wish every member of the Holy Trinity community a happy and healthy summer filled with safe travel, fabulous fun, and the making of lots of great new memories! As you go forth in this season of sunshine – to the pool, the park, summer camps, the beach, or a new vacation spot -- remember to spread that salt and light! I played goalie, which came with its personality quirks but also meant I know how to handle stressful situations. I am a cradle Lutheran. I have a dry sense of humor most of the time, but I can also be very silly in the right circumstances. My "superpower" might be that I can get songs stuck in other people's heads by singing (not well) while I work, but they do not end up getting stuck in my head. I have one sibling named Devin. He has had type 1 diabetes since he was 16 months old, which I think contributes to my large fear of needles. In an attempt to fight my fear, I have been getting tattoos. I am now up to 4—one for each of my family members and a large Celtic cross on my back. The others are roadrunner from Loony-toons, a thistle, and the Greek word for brother with the American Diabetes Association symbol as the D. I am currently dating and plan to be engaged to another seminarian before the start of internship. Her name is Maddie Tallman. In high school, I spent 4 years on the Lincoln Douglas-style debate team. I credit my time on the team for my comfort in speaking in front of people. I have held leadership positions in a few student groups including Lutheran Campus Ministry at the U. of Minnesota. I enjoy reading science fiction and fantasy novels in my free time. I'm a dog person, but also love cats. Most of the jobs I've held were in food service, so dealing with grumpy, hyper-critical people has become a strength of mine as well. On Enneagram, I am a 2W3 and on Myers-Briggs I am a INTP.

Eye Care International—Each February, Phil Loar, John Bowen and varying HT members travel with a team recruited by and under the auspices of Eye Care International to medically underserved areas of El Salvador. Over the two-week period, 500 patients needing eye care are treated each day by the team of opticians, optometrists, ophthalmologists, nurses and lay assistants. Eyes are screened, false eyes or glasses are provided as needed, minor diseases are addressed and surgery is preformed where needed. (Each ophthalmologist on the team can do 10 surgeries a day in whatever space they can find and make sterile.)

In addition to representation by Phil, John and others, HT members donate eye glasses and HT WELCA provides hundreds of cotton eye cloths (toallitas). The toallitas are dispensed with instructions that they are to be used only with clean water and only to keep eyes free of the dust and smoke that is prevalent. As a member of past teams, Mary Bowen noted that recipients are grateful for the care and for the toallitas. In recognition of the extent of the need, WELCA Needlecrafters invite all HT knitters and friends to join us in making toallitas (see instructions).

Octo Project—Plans are underway to participate in the Octo Project (a worldwide project that has crafters help preemies thrive by crocheting octopuses for babies in

Cotton Eye Cloths (Toallitas)

(Use Sugar and Cream All Cotton Yarn and 6, 7, or 8 needles)

Cast on 4 stitches.

Knit two rows.

In the next row knit 2, yarn over, and knit across row.

Continue in this manner until you have 41 stitches on the needle.

Next row, knit 2, knit 2 together, yarn over, knit 2 together, knit across row.

Continue until you have 5 stitches on the needle.

Then knit 2 together, knit next 3 stitches.

Knit one row of the 4 stitches and then bind off.

Human Trafficking News

Justice for Survivors of Online Sex Trafficking

 On March 22, the U.S. Senate passed the Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act (SESTA). This is a historic and major legislative victory in the fight Our Commitment: We, the Women of the ELCA, are committed to help eradicate human trafficking by creating awareness in our communities, advocating for more protection and rehabilitation for victims, and participating in anti-trafficking campaigns in our churches, schools, and neighborhoods.

to stop human trafficking. This bill provides access to justice for survivors of online sex trafficking and gives states critical tools for combatting this crime. It also provides a much-needed update to the Communications Decency Act (CDA) to help hold websites like *Backpage* accountable when they knowingly facilitate sex trafficking. On April 11, the President signed the Act into law – H.R. 1865. Survivors, their families and anti-trafficking advocates celebrated this long-awaited measure to combat online sex trafficking. Seven *Backpage* executives were charged in a 93-count indictment for knowingly facilitating child sex trafficking. Now, state prosecutors can prevent similar websites from taking over *Backpage*'s market share. Senators Rob Portman (R-OH) and Richard Blumenthal (D-CT) spearheaded this legislation through Congress, and we are grateful for the tireless efforts of survivor advocates who relentlessly fought to help keep others from facing exploitation online. But most of all, we thank the thousands of supporters who took action on SESTA by sending letters and signed petitions to their elected officials.

- ♦ **36-Hour Hack-a-thon** Expedition Hacks. A local technology strategy firm gathered technology companies, government agencies, and experts for a hack-a-thon challenge at George Mason University from April 14 to 15. In this series, participants created innovative tools to combat human trafficking such as:
- Mapping high trafficking routes so company travelers can avoid these areas and alert others
- A Block Chain showing how Federal Agencies and local law enforcement can work together with a trusted chain of data to help find victims
- A Facial Recognition App that can connect with security cameras in hotels and places where trafficking activity

The Hack-a-thon tried to make a dent in this highly profitable global criminal industry. When people collaborate around a very worthwhile cause, great things can happen.

Polaris' newest program is focused on disrupting human trafficking networks in illicit massage businesses and residential brothels by strengthening the safety net for victims in these venues and calling for strategic action to stop traffickers from harming more people.

Wisconsin composer Paul McKlveen wrote the piece with Eric, a faithful servant, in mind. Music Sunday, June 3, 2018,


was the debut of the composition.


