Pastor's Peace

⁶ They went through the region of Phrygia and Galatia, having been <u>forbidden by the Holy Spirit to speak the word</u> in Asia. ⁷ When they had come opposite Mysia, they attempted to go into Bithynia, <u>but the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them</u>; ⁸ so, passing by Mysia, they went down to Troas. (Acts 16:6-8)

The above verses of scriptures may seem a bit odd for a newsletter, but they are actually very important to us and our lives today. Right before this section, in Acts chapter 15, Paul and his companions are commissioned by the elders to go and bring the Gospel of Jesus to the Gentile community to the north. It is here in Acts chapter 16 that Paul and his companions are discerning the direction of the Holy Spirit. Notice the Spirit's guidance away from some areas and into different areas.

These verses are selected for this newsletter article, because I believe the same Spirit that guided Paul away from Asia and Bithynia is guiding us, as evangelists, away from the Mosaic District. We could easily replace the word Asia from the verse above and list a number of restaurants in the Mosaic District that did not allow us to advertise or put up a sign about hosting a Bible Study in their space.

We could also replace the area of Bithynia with the area of the Mosaic District and say with confidence that the Spirit did not let us put down roots in the area by just looking at all of the events and activities we offered without having the ability to grow a second community. For example:

Since we started in January 2017, we tried the following gathering opportunities: Wednesday evening gatherings on rotational themes: Education, Worship, Community Service and Fellowship @ Blackfinn, Sunday Evening Worship @ Angelika Theater, Sunday Evening Dinner Church @ Cyclone Anayas, Monthly Service Nights @ Brother's Brother, Wednesday Evening Bible Study @ Caboose Commons, Thursday Morning Playgroup @ Mosaic Community Room, and Sunday Evening Pub-Church @ Caboose.

Additionally, we tried the following **outreach initiatives**: Merrifield Fall Festivals, Holiday Auction Fundraisers @ Fair Trade Winds, Seasonal Flyer Drops in Mosaic, Non-Profit Fundraisers @ Blackfinn, January Coat Drive @ Dunn Loring Metro, Ash Wednesday Ashes @ Dunn Loring Metro, Easter Sunrise Worship, Food Donations with Mom's Organic, Fair Trade Coffee Giveaways with Fair Trade Winds, Facebook Advertising/Marketing, Meetup

Groups, Onsite Evangelist, Ice-cream Giveaway with Ben & Jerry's, Wednesday "Office Hours" @ Mom & Pop, Fair Trade Popup Store @ Caboose.

We put in a lot of hard work and effort, but we must acknowledge that the Spirit did not allow us to go into the Mosaic District. And you know what, that is OK.

The questions now become for us, where is God calling us next? Paul does not say, "oh we can't go to Asia and Bithynia so we must just give up on sharing the Gospel." No, instead he and his companions try a different direction and a different community, more specifically through Troas to Macedonia. What happens in Macedonia?

14 A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. 15 When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us. (Acts 16:14-15)

Notice the difference? Paul and his companions are welcomed, listened to, invited in, offered hospitality and the whole family is baptized – thus starting a new community of faith. This is the work of the Spirit offering affirmation, and this is what we are looking for in our next destination.

So, fellow companions, where are we to go next? Where, as the name of the Metro DC Synod's campaign title suggests, are we to make New Connections? What is your sense of the Spirit? Where do you see an opportunity to share the Gospel and start a second site to our congregation? This question is completely serious—I would like to know and I encourage you to tell me if you have an idea.

The Church Council has decided to take the rest of 2019 and discern the direction of the Spirit. May it be clear and light up a bright path to our next destination.

Thank you all for your prayers and support for our efforts in the Mosaic District for over two years. I, along with many of the leadership at the larger church levels, am very proud of you and your willingness to reach outside of the congregation and introduce the Gospel to new people.

May the end of Lent and start of the Easter season bring signs of death and new life to you, your family and your neighborhood.

Council News

"All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved." Acts 2:45-47

The life of the early church described in Acts seems simple viewed through the complicated lens of our daily lives, balancing the demands of our jobs, families and communities. But really, the way we come together as church is similar in many ways to the church of the early Christians: we give of what we have, break bread together and work to serve each other and our community, and above all we praise God. Thinking of the past month, where we came together and served our community through hypothermia week, giving generously of our time and our possessions, where we opened our doors to music lovers in our community with an incredible organ concert, and where we, as always, came together to praise God, I think that the early Christians would recognize us as a community of Christ.

This month, your Church Council is working on our budget for the fiscal year that will begin on July 1st. Pastor Mike has shared with you our hope that we might be able to hire a youth minister to support both our older youth and the newest and smallest members of our community in growing in their faith. He has also shared with you his thoughts, and our discussions in Council, on the difficulty Holy Trinity has faced in developing a second site in the Mosaic District, and how we are thinking of new ways to establish a second site as we move in a new direction. We also hope to continue the many programs that each of us values—not only those programs and ministries that support our own community, but also the benevolences supporting those in need in our surrounding community and around the world.

Unfortunately, we are finding that giving is less than it was at this time last year, and we are having to contemplate some difficult choices. Although I'm confident that we will be able to work through this challenge, we welcome your ideas and your prayers as we develop the budget. I would also encourage each of you to take a look at your pledges for this year, both for regular Sunday giving and for the 70th anniversary fund, to see if you're where you hoped to be at this point in the year.

Results of Sunday Schedule Survey Check-In: A one-page paper survey was made available to members of the congregation on two consecutive Sundays — February 24 and March 3—asking how their attendance at church has or has not changed as a result of moving from two Sunday services to one last fall.

Thanks to all those who responded to the survey. A total of 66 surveys were completed with the following results:

- ♦ 80% of respondents (52 people) reporting that going to one service has not changed their worship attendance, but four (6% of total respondents) indicated that they are attending the Christian Education Hour less because of the change.
- ♦ **16%** of respondents (10 people) reported attending worship and the Christian Education Hour less because of the schedule change
- 6% of respondents (4 people) said they're attending worship more frequently as a result of the change.

Council reviewed these results at our March 11 meeting and we plan to check in again with the congregation at the end of the summer — the one-year mark for the schedule change — to gather more input on what's working and what's not with the current Sunday schedule.

How Does One Become a Vicar? Part 3

In the last newsletter, I left off our story during the summer before I started Seminary. I had been entranced, chosen

my seminary and was ready to move to Chicago. It'd be impossible to capture everything that has happened at Seminary the last two years that led me to being the Vicar at Holy Trinity so I will do my best to be brief and stick to the highlights which include meeting Maddie, Public Church Fellows, CPE, Shekinah Chapel, and Internship Assignment.

I met Maddie on a bus my first week of seminary. Our first conversation was an argument about whether Maryland or Minnesota-Duluth was the real UMD, and as far as I know it almost didn't happen. It had been a really hot day in Chicago and for some reason or another the buses were running slowly, like extremely slowly. Her group had gotten to the place where you switch from train to bus much sooner than mine, and if it hadn't been for the delay, we probably would have been on different buses and met later under different circumstances. We started dating in mid-October, and managed to keep our relationship "secret" for about 2 weeks before the whole campus knew. Suffice to say we weren't obvious, but not exactly subtle either. It helped that we had almost exactly the same schedule and were both part of a fellowship program that semester, so we spent a lot of time together. It was great, but also not all that happened, so moving on...

Public Church Fellows is a scholarship program where students who show skills in taking Church outside the four walls partner with an outside organization and work 7 hours a week as a volunteer while receiving a stipend every month. In my two years with the program I worked with a Muslim group called IMAN (Inner city Muslim Action Network) as part of their Food Desert Campaign. I helped invite community members to different events by going door knocking and also created some visuals for them to use as part of their presentations to various groups. The only downside to working with them is that their office was an hour bus ride from school and I didn't have a car, so during my second year I switched to working with the People Lobby, a grassroots organizing movement that hold public officials accountable and tries to create and implement a vision for the future in which all people are taken care of.

Clinical Pastoral Education is a requirement before you can be "Endorsed" to go on internship in the ELCA. It is a program where you work full time as a intern-chaplain at a hospital, visiting patients and honing your pastoral care skills. I did mine at the University of Minnesota Twin Cities during the summer of 2017. I learned a lot about pastoral care and working with colleagues, but for numerous reasons, it wasn't my favorite experience. Working overnights and getting no sleep, having almost every attempt to see Maddie go slightly awry (1 ticket, 2 cancelled flights, and many sleepy phone calls aren't fun). Although I learned a lot, I accepted the fact that it is very much not my calling to be a full time chaplain.

At LSTC during a student's second year, you are assigned to a local church to work for ten hours a week as part of Ministry in Context or MIC. Think of it as a very mininternship. I was assigned to Shekinah Chapel in Riverdale, IL. There were a lot of things that made my experience at Shekinah one of the best things I've done at seminary. I sang in a gospel choir, taught confirmation in a context I wasn't wholly comfortable in at first, and preached a 25 minute sermon. Those people became my family for a year, and I will always be thankful for the lessons they taught me and how they welcomed me.

The last seminary highlight that led me to you was Internship assignment. There is a normal process for being assigned a site, but Maddie and I didn't follow it. We knew we wanted to be near each other for internship, and Maddie—as part of her emphasis—needed a site with Spanish ministry, so in August, we began working with the Field Ed office to find something that would work. Weeks would go by and we wouldn't hear anything and when we did, it wasn't good news. In February, Maddie finally called one of her former bosses at the Metro DC Synod and he was able to help Field Ed find sites that worked for us. It still wasn't a smooth process though; I had two other churches fall through before Holy Trinity finally worked out, and, because of a sabbatical and summer travel, communication with Maddie was sparse from the site. Finally, in late May or early June, we both had sites confirmed and only one month to relax and prepare to move out here. Seminary has been a whirlwind so far and I'm sure that isn't going to change, but I'm really glad that I ended up here at Holy Trinity for internship.

Getting Connected

During our 70th anniversary year, we have featured Holy Trinity's history by decades.

HOLY TRINITY 2000-2019 NEW CENTURY, NEW WAYS TO SERVE

Holy Trinity members and clergy (Douglas Ryniewicz, our



pastor from 2002-2006, Jane Halpern, our associate pastor from 2003-2007 and senior pastor from 2007-2015, and Mike Gutzler, starting in 2015) have been very busy in the last two decades, both serving others and reaching out to our local community

and to others far away.

International—Holy Trinity has been of service to others in this new century. Our members and pastors have volunteered their time in Bolivia, El Salvador, Haiti, and Puerto Rico, to help those less fortunate.

Local—Within the United States, our service projects have include our annual Hypothermia week, when our church facility has become a temporary homeless shelter. Holy Trinity members have been feeding, conversing with and connecting with 30-40 homeless individuals for one week each winter. Our members support nearby Graham Road Elementary School, providing books, backpacks, school supplies, and tutors. Our members have provided household goods for refuges sponsored by Lutheran Social Services. We have provided (and delivered) sports equipment for young people in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria in Puerto Rico. We have contributed to the Gifts of Hope program, and helped support the Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission School in Rock Point, Arizona. Daniel Rinehart was our Director of Congregational Mission from 2016-2017 and was instrumental in many of these service projects.

Outreach—The new century has seen new programs for outreach. In 2011 the Vitality Group was formed, and its members have helped provide a presence for Holy Trinity at Falls Church City Memorial Day celebrations and at Merrifield Fall Festivals, in the newly opened Mosaic District. Programs at Holy Trinity have included Breakfast with Santa, Jazz Coffee House, and Oktoberfest. Mainly Music is a Tuesday morning hour-long program for children and their parents/caregivers offering interactive

music and play and fellowship.

In addition to the Jazz Coffee House, our music program has included visiting choirs and many wonderful concerts, many of which are recurring in our new *Concerts at Holy Trinity* series. In 2015 Holy Trinity obtained a baby grand piano for services in the sanctuary that do not use the organ.

RIC—In May 2015, after over a year-long period of discernment, Holy Trinity's congregation voted to become a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation as certified by Reconciling Works: Lutherans for Full Participation. Reconciling in Christ (RIC) is a designation of ELCA synods and churches who adopt an affirmation of welcome to persons of all sexual orientations and gender identities. The RIC Committee at Holy Trinity continues to actively seek ways to be more welcoming through outreach, hosting events and special services.

Other Holy Trinity programs of this century (some carried over from the last century) have included:

- Theology on Tap
- ♦ Men's Breakfast
- ♦ Faith Outside the Box
- ♦ WELCA Book Club
- Needlcrafters
- Knitting and Crochet Ministry
- OWLS (Older, Wiser, Loving Souls) which was formerly LAG (Leisure Activity Group)
- ◆ Friendship Tables (gatherings of Holy Trinity members for dinners together)

Soon after Pastor Mike Gutzler became Holy Trinity's pastor in 2015, our congregation voted on two significant new events in the life of our church. In November 2016, we voted to become a multi-site congregation. In the Mosaic district of Merrifield, **Mosaic District Church** was formed, and it has offered opportunities for worship, fellowship, education, and service to others, on Wednesday and Sunday evenings. At that location Holy Trinity also offered a Thursday morning playgroup for young children.

The second significant event in Holy Trinity's history was the decision, made in June 2017, to offer available space in our building for a much-needed daycare center in our community. **Building Blocks Day School II** opened in March 2018. Our church continues to look for new ways to serve others.

Committed to the belief that inspirational music can create a community of interfaith and racial harmony, the choir members represent several different races, numerous faith traditions, and a variety of occupations. Careful; you just might end up singing along before the end of the evening!

Of course I would be remiss if I didn't speak to the rich musical offerings we will have in our own upcoming services at Holy Trinity, relying almost entirely from the talents of members of our congregation. At our single service on Easter this year (starting with a prelude a little *before* 10 a.m.) you are bound to be awakened by the power of our traditional brass quartet in combination with our lovely organ. You will also get to hear the vocal choir and bell choir as they fill out the musical portions of our service.

The members of Sisters' Choice Quilters (SCQ) have gifted Holy Trinity four banners for the white seasons




Ocean City Handbell Festival


We also took in beautiful views of the bay (the sunset on Friday night was stunning!) and enjoyed social time together in Ocean City and on the road.



From Stonewall to Reconciling in Christ

June 28, 1969. The Stonewall Inn in New York City's Greenwich Village was the site of a revolution. In the early morning hours following one police raid too many, the LGBT patrons of the bar rose up against the police and began a riot that echoes to this day. Many consider this rebellion against the anti-gay legal system in NYC the beginnings of the fight for LGBT rights in the United States.

In 1974, the group Reconciling Works: Lutherans for Full Participation was formed to advocate "for the full welcome, inclusion, and equity of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) Lutherans in all aspects of the life of their Church, congregations, and community." They instituted the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) program to provide a structured way for ELCA congregations, synods and other ministry settings to discern and promote their willingness to be fully inclusive and welcoming to all.

There are currently 865 RIC communities, with 385 engaged in their discernment process. Holy Trinity

completed our over a year long journey to RIC on May 31, 2015. We voted to become a RIC congregation, and to approve this Affirmation of Welcome: Holy Trinity Lutheran Church welcomes the participation of people of all ages, ethnic back-grounds, sexual orientations, gender identities, educational backgrounds, and economic conditions. We welcome all who seek to know God. We commit to being a Reconciling In Christ congregation.

This year, in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of Stonewall, we celebrate our 4th year as a RIC congregation. Stay tuned to your bulletins, social media and emails for more info on plans being made for June:

- The Capital Pride Parade and Festival 2019 will be held in D.C. on June 8th and 9th.
- Please plan to attend our RIC Sunday worship service on June 30th, the day dedicated to ours being a church that truly welcomes all who enter. We look forward to seeing you. There will be cake!


