### Pastor's Peace

### Happy New Year - Let's Study the Gospel of Mark!

On the slim chance you have not been to church since Christmas Eve, let me be the first to tell you that you need to come back and check out our deep dive into the Gospel of Mark. The Gospel of Mark is a very important document that ultimately shapes our understanding of Jesus still today.

Just to make sure you understand how important this opportunity is to study the Gospel of Mark, here are my top 10 reasons why you should come to love and understand the Gospel of Mark.

- 1) **No Christmas!** Wait, what?! That is correct, the Gospel of Mark starts with the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River. This has significant ramifications on how we come to understand the person of Jesus. What if the Christmas story was either not known or not important to the author's community?
- 2) **No Resurrection!** Wait, what?! That is also correct, the earliest versions of the Gospel of Mark end with the empty tomb but no resurrected Jesus sightings. The gospel ends with a focus on salvation.
- 3) Mark was Copied. Yes, it is true, both Matthew and Luke took Mark's writing word for word for their own gospels. Nearly all scholars agree that both Matthew and Luke had Mark's gospel in front of them when they wrote their own.
- 4) **The Gospel of Mark is the Earliest**. This is important for several reasons:
  - a. It was written before the destruction of the temple in Jerusalem and was intended for the followers of the early Jesus movement.
  - b. There is no other text like it. Mark is the first one to call this biography-style written document a Gospel.
  - c. This is the first written story of Jesus. Most likely there were oral stories shared about Jesus to go along with the letters of Paul, but there was never a complete compilation of the whole Jesus narrative until Mark's Gospel.
- 5) **The Messianic Secret**. Secrets?! Oh yes. The Jesus of Mark's Gospel continually instructs people not to tell anyone about what he has done. Why would this original written narrative have Jesus act so secretively?
- 6) **Parables, but no Sermon**. Mark's Gospel is primarily a collection of stories about what Jesus did, and less about what Jesus said. We don't have a Sermon on the Mount or a Sermon on the Plain like we do in the Gospel of Matthew and Luke respectively. This makes the limited words we have in the Gospel of Mark that much more intriguing.
- 7) Radical Shift in Thinking about what is "Holy." One of the main themes of Mark that still impacts us today is the new idea that holiness is not limited to a geographical space. Jesus moves the concept of holiness away from the temple and starts to talk about the Kingdom of God coming near.
- 8) Radical Shift in Thinking about what is "Unholy." To counterbalance Jesus' take on what is considered holy, he also helps change the perspective on what is considered unholy by eating, drinking and spending time with sinners.
- 9) **God of Rules to a God of Love.** Just a couple chapters into Mark's Gospel it is clear to see Jesus is a rule breaker, more specifically a religious rule breaker. To his audience this would be considered outrageous. Upon a closer look, the reader will also notice the breaking of the religious rules is always out of love for the other.
- 10) The Real Meaning of Messiah. Probably the greatest shift of all is in the understanding of what it means to be a messiah. The people around Jesus were looking for one particular kind of messiah someone who looked like King David, but Jesus offers them something else a crucifix. And thus, this symbol of death transforms our lives to the point that we wear it today as jewelry.

In addition to these top ten reasons, there are also a bunch of great stories of people Jesus encounters along his way. Their stories are also our stories of religious ancestors. I hope you join us for the journey to Palm Sunday so you too many be inspired by this very important and world changing document which we call the Gospel – good news.



### Council News

### Fall 2019 Highlights

The HT Council had a busy fall and kept up the pace through the end of 2019. A part-time Children, Youth, and Family (CYF) Coordinator position was established and filled to provide more support for that ministry area while we continue to seek candidates for a full-time

position. Numerous required amendments to the HT Constitution were accomplished at the Fall Congregational Meeting on November 17th. And once the final donations to the 70th Anniversary Special Campaign arrived, more than \$18,000 was distributed to benevolent organizations, including Lutheran Social Services, FACETS, and United Lutheran Seminary, and more than \$18,000 was moved to HT's Long-Range Maintenance fund to be invested in facility improvements or repairs needed over time. (The remaining \$18,000+ had previously been designated for the one-year "seed money" funding of the new CYF staff position.) It was great that the people of HT evidenced such thankfulness to God for our 70 years of ministry.

Fall 2019 also saw establishment of a new Stewardship Team that developed and implemented a successful Fall Campaign around a theme of joyful generosity. The Campaign goals were to increase the number of pledge cards returned and the average total weekly giving to HT by \$1000 so as to enable continued funding of a CYF staff position and meet increased operating costs. A special \$5000 "challenge gift" was offered by one of our members if the target for returned pledge cards was exceeded—and happily it was. The increased weekly giving goal was more than met as well, thanks in part to new giving pledges from many of the people who joined HT in 2019. Thank you to all who responded to the stewardship messages with joyful giving! And thank you also to the Stewardship Team—Deb Haynes, Autumn Kendrick, Lauren McCann, Kim Silva, Brent Stone and Pastor Mike—and others who provided the materials, videos, temple talks, and so much more that invited our consideration of what we are called to do in response to God's many blessings in our lives.

### 2020 Goal Setting and Planning

Council also spent time over several meetings this fall to consider what our annual goals should be for 2020. The work included completing a needs assessment focused on the "four quadrants" expression of HT's mission (Inviting, Connecting, Discipling, Sending/Serving) and discussing what recent and upcoming developments (e.g., re-establishment of a Stewardship Team, Pastor Mike's sabbatical) should mean for 2020 Council goals.

Four goals emerged from this process and were formally adopted by Council at our January 13th meeting:

- 1. Develop Targeted New Services and Resources to Improve Ministry Reach and Effectiveness
- 2.Fill a Full-Time Staff Position to Lead CYF Ministry and Support Other Ministry Development
- 3. Develop a Year-Round Stewardship Program
- 4.Develop Comprehensive Property Management Procedures and an Expanded Property Committee

Council's "goal work" for the next few months will be focused on Goal #1. Our efforts will include interviewing HT visitors, new members, and established members as well as several of our "small groups" to elicit their thoughts and experiences regarding HT outreach, ministries, and operations. The interviews are an important part of the process Council is using to determine what new services and resources to develop, so if you are asked to participate, please say yes! Work also will be underway on the other three goals.

Another focal point for Council in the coming few months will be planning for Pastor Mike's upcoming sabbatical and the related "Congregational Renewal" activities that are being made possible by the Lily Foundation grant received by HT and Pastor Mike. In addition to covering the expense of substitute pastoral care and worship leaders, grant dollars will fund summer fellowship and relaxation activities for the congregation, a special congregational learning and reflection program, and post-sabbatical programming this fall through which Pastor Mike will share what he learned and discerned in his time away. A Lily Grant team is being assembled to do the detailed planning for the Congregational Renewal activities. If you'd like to help, just let me (lori.wicks01@gmail.com) or Pastor Mike know.







you have any questions or are available to serve, please see Jean or contact the church office.



# Serving Our Neighbor

### **Graham Road Elementary School News**

In late November, we received a request from the counselor at Graham Road school to support some of their neediest families for the holidays. Because the request came when it did and we were already sponsoring the Angel Tree for FACETS families and the Metro DC Gifts of Hope, we didn't put out a general appeal to the congregation. Instead, some HT members who have volunteered at the school stepped up to help two families.

One was a single-parent family, a mother with three children at GRES, twin boys in 4<sup>th</sup> grade and a girl in 6<sup>th</sup> grade. The second family consisted of a mother, father and three children. The mother had recently given birth to her third child. She hadn't been able to return to work since his birth and the father was unemployed. Their two daughters are in kindergarten and first grade.

With their permission, we contacted them to find out what they needed. Both mothers requested warm clothes and a book for each child. Although no toys were requested, we purchased one toy in addition to a book for each child, along with warm shirts, pants, and coats. We got non-perishable food items from the Knox Food Pantry and \$50 gift cards for each family from Giant for perishable items.

We wrapped all the gifts, labeling them to each child from Santa, and delivered them along with the food on a day the children were in school. Seeing the meager furnishings in their apartments, it was clear their needs are great. Both moms were very grateful for the gifts and food.

It was gratifying to be able to bring some Christmas cheer to these two families in our community. Perhaps next year, with more advance notice, Holy Trinity can offer help to more families.

### **Book Give-Away**

# Serving Our Neighbor

In 2019, congregational gifts provided over 118,000 CWS Blankets and Kits to families impacted by hurricanes, tornadoes, flooding and other crises (including homelessness and poverty).

Here's what your gift could mean in 2020:

Your gift supports two types of CWS Blankets:

**HEAVYWEIGHT:** These woolen blankets are great for frigid temperatures. They hold heat extremely well, they're water resistant, and they don't easily catch fire so people can use them while warming up by a heat source.

LIGHTWEIGHT: Appropriate for warmer climates, these fleece blankets keep families covered without adding bulk if they have to move around a lot. Fleece is water repellant, durable, warm and soft.

Families also share that they use blankets: • As insulated padding if they have to sleep on hard, cold surfaces

 As room dividers if they're staying in shelters and need a moment of privacy
 As bags to carry supplies if they must move from place to place
